

I am setting out my voting record on the indicative votes and on Brexit. As I have said before, I favour the Prime Minister's Deal and will continue to vote for it as long as it is brought back to the floor of the House of Commons. It is not a perfect deal by any means, but it already contains the necessary compromises and takes account of the views of those like me who voted to remain. It is the first step and leads to two years of intensive negotiation on what the relationship between the UK and the EU should be – a negotiation which will be conducted without Theresa May as Prime Minister.

Let me repeat what I have said before, the Referendum was a national vote, not a vote based on individual constituencies which were neither the voting nor the counting entities. As a nation, the voting was to leave.

None of the options in both sets of indicative votes were whipped. There was no party line to follow.

The first set of indicative votes were held on 27 March. There were 8 options. These were:
